

Art of the Americas Selections from the IDB Collection

To mark its ninth anniversary, the IDB Cultural Center will present the exhibition Art of the Americas: Selections from the IDB Art Collection from May 8-June 15, as well as a concert by the Bobenrieth Ensemble on May 15.

The exhibition will present a selection of artworks owned by the IDB that have never been exhibited before to the public. The Cultural Center is responsible for managing the Bank's collection, which serves to enhance and embellish the work environment with quality works by artists from the Bank's member countries. The Center also organizes traveling exhibitions in the United States and abroad. These exhibitions promote good will and educate the public about Latin America and the Caribbean. Such exhibitions have traveled to Salisbury State University in Maryland,

York College in Pennsylvania, the Central Bank Museum Foundation in San José, Costa Rica, and the Light Cultural Center in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

The IDB supports economic and social development. While culture is important to that process, collecting art is not a Bank priority. In recent years, acquisition of art has been less than frequent, and the challenge to incorporate new works into the collection has become as rigorous as in any other public collection. To ensure the highest degree of professional criteria in the selection of art, and the preservation of the Bank's image and investment, all works offered to the Bank as gifts, as well as all prospective purchases, are presented to an Acquisitions Committee following inspection and recommendation by the Curator. A team of three professionals not associated with the

Bank provide counsel that is crucial to maintaining the standards of quality expected from an institution such as the IDB.

Development of the visual arts in the Americas throughout history varies widely from country to country. Over the past 500 years, the multicultural, multiethnic and pluralistic composition of the various societies has resulted in very different forms of artistic expression. It is uncommon to find such a wide variety of works in a single collection. Works at the IDB range from those of Robert Rauschenberg of the United States to the Canadians Mayureak Ashoona and Kananginak Pootoogook, Rodolfo Abularach of Guatemala, Fernando de Szyszlo of Peru, Maxwell Taylor of the Bahamas, and George Struikelblok of Suriname. Also featured is the work of one of the piv-

otal figures of modern western art, Roberto Matta of Chile.

This eclectic nature, along with the fact that the collection has been professionally managed only in the last nine years of the Bank's institutional life, prompted the Cultural Center to divide its collection into two groups: the decorative and the institutional. The latter comprises the most significant artworks from an artistic and historical perspective, and selections from that group make up this exhibition.

Finally, the exhibition includes a selection of newspaper articles published on the occasion of past exhibitions organized by the Cultural Center.



Bobenrieth Ensemble

Concert

The Tsobenzieth Ensemble was founded by Chilean-born accordionist Manuel (Manny) Bobenzieth. The instrumentation also features vibraphone and percussion, piano, electric guitar, violin, and bass. The ensemble's repertoire includes jazz, classical and American popular music, with works by composers as diverse as Cole Porter, Brazilian Antonio Carlos Jobim, and the Ensemble's main focus, Argentine tango composer Astor Piazzolla.

The Bobenrieth Ensemble has performed to sellout audiences at such renowned venues as Blues Alley, the Corcoran Gallery, and the Kennedy Center. The group's debut CD, *Tangata*, was called "a rare treat...crisp, original and flawless" by *Jazz Review*.

Manny Bobenrieth has been with the United States Army Band since 1986. As an accordionist with the Army Strolling Strings, he has performed numerous times at the White House, the State Department and the Vice President's residence. Violinist Bruno Nasta is currently the Music Contractor and Personnel Director of the National Gallery of Art's National Gallery Orchestra. Guitarist Chuck Underwood performs with his own jazz trio. Chuck Redd (vibes/percussion) is a member of the New York-based Loren Schoenberg Big Band and the Smithsonian Jazz Masterworks Orchestra. Thomas Fowler is principal bassist of the U.S. Army Chamber Orchestra. And pianist Kathleen Burchedean, who has played for every Administration since President Ford, is retired from the U.S. Army Band, and is currently a free-lance violinist and piano teacher.
